FROM THE PROGRAM DIRECTOR

Approached by one of our younger students last fall about attending high school in DC, I was upset to discover that he had been denied entrance because he did not possess a Social Security card. After searching on the Internet about how to enroll a child in the DC Public Schools, I discovered the process was lengthy and confusing, especially to people who could not speak English. We set up a testing appointment and the student completed a lengthy four hour assessment. Next on the list were vaccinations. Not an easy process, especially since the immunization clinics were open only at certain

times, had no Spanish speaking staff members, and the TB clinic was far away.

With a completed assessment test and an immunization card full of vaccinations, we went over to the high school to enroll. We went into the office and were promptly turned away because the student's residency documents were not appropriate. We returned to the school in late December and finally enrolled the student in classes. His progress so far has been great and his English has improved dramatically. He has adjusted well, made new friends within his age group, and is very excited about earning his high school diploma. See David's story on the cover.
