Language ETC's April 28, 2006 Silent Auction Fundraiser

On Friday, April 28th, Language ETC will be hosting its first Annual Silent Auction fundraiser in the LETC auditorium from 5-8pm. Auction proceeds will go towards daycare costs. Kid's Corner Daycare Center has partnered with LETC to provide daycare services for enrolled students, because in the past, many students with small children have been unable to attend classes. Providing free childcare has been the solution, but childcare costs have reached as much as \$10,000 a term. Our goal is to raise at least \$5,000 to help cover this overwhelming, but necessary cost. Auction tickets are \$15 when purchased in advance at the LETC office or through our website at www.languageetc.org. Tickets will cost \$20 at the door on the 28th. Language Lab

The Language Lab provides another component of learning, serving as a place for students to further their study of English Language using computer-based programs. Teachers bring their classes to the lab to utilize grammar, vocabulary, and pronunciation programs. In addition, students can use the computers during lab hours before classes on evenings and weekends. During that time, Language Lab Coordinators help students to use the ESL software to open email accounts and create resumes. The Language Lab is popular with students as a means to both further their skills in ESL as well as in technology.

All About The GED

For those ready to make the **commitment** to complete their high school education through the GED, Language ETC offers a program of classes and personalized attention in Spanish to help students prepare.

The General Educational Development (**GED**) Exam is a nationally recognized measure of High School Equivalency issued by the State to a student once specific, approved high school equivalency tests are passed. The State is responsible for the oversight and supervision of GED Testing Centers. The Exam gives people from all walks of life another chance to earn a high school certificate. **Passing the GED Exam is an important achievement that leads to a valuable credential.**

Why take the GED Exam?

The GED Exam can be the key to employment advancement, acceptance into a college, university or a technical or vocational training program, and increased self-esteem. The GED

Credential earned through passing the GED Exam is accepted by 95% of United States employers, colleges, and universities.

How long does it take to prepare for the GED Exam? It all depends on one's skill level, attendance and most of all, to the goal. While one student might complete the program in 2 months, another might need 2 years.

What are the GED Tests?

The GED Tests are a rigorous measure of an individual's present knowledge and skills no matter where those skills were acquired. The academic content of the GED tests is frequently upgraded to reflect reforms made in the nation's public high schools. Such changes are made in order to meet the increasing demands of college, the workforce, and today's knowledge-based economy.

The GED Exam covers five core subject areas required in a traditional high school curriculum. With the exception of Language Arts - Writing

Skills, which requires you to write an essay, and the Mathematics Test, which has open-ended questions that require that some of the answers be entered on to an Alternative Grid or a Coordinate Plane, all of the questions on the GED Test are multiple choice with five possible answers given. The questions range in difficulty from easy to hard, and cover a wide variety of subjects.

The GED Tests are offered in three languages: English, Spanish and French. It is the same exam with the same content in all three languages. The tests require about seven and a half hours to complete, not including time set aside for breaks and instructions.

Student: Juliana Lozano

Program: Sunday AM

Level: Advanced

My name is Juliana Lozano. I'm from Lima, Peru. I'm the second of five brothers and sisters. I've been in the United States since January 2001. Since I'm 18 years old I always wanted to live here in the United States. Now I'm 31 years old and I still think the same way. I remember very well my first days in this country. I arrived in Los Angeles, California in a neighborhood called Marina del Rey. The first days I was so excited to be there; it was like a dream came true, but the only problem that I had in those moments was the English; that made me feel inferior to the other people and sometimes I didn't want to go outside. I didn't want to go to the supermarket. The first weeks to me were bad. In spite of learning basic English in Santiago Chile, another country where I lived before coming to the U.S., I was ashamed when I tried to speak English. For that reason, I preferred to say nothing. I felt as a handicapped person. When I moved to Washington, D.C. in January 2002, one of the first things I did was to search for a place where I could study English; I enrolled in LETC because it is the only one which has classes on Sunday mornings. I like this school. I like my class and I like my teacher. I'm thankful to LETC. It helped me and helps people like me who want to learn English. Although this school is a charity, the quality of the teachers is great. Now I feel confident. I love this language. My goal is to go to college. Meanwhile, I'm enjoying my classes in LETC and taking advantage of all the things that LETC can give me as a student. When I hear someone who wants to study English, I always recommend LETC. LETC helped me and is still helping me. Sometimes I feel too tired to study because I have to work, but I always encourage myself, repeating over and over again that when I am in college, I'll be prouder of myself than I am now. That is why every Sunday, even though I'm tired, I always attend class because I couldn't forgive myself if I didn't take advantage of these classes.

I am studying English in the United States because I want to realize my dream. When I was in my country, I tried to learn English, but I did not finish for different reasons. I always told myself that if someday I could come to the USA one of the things that I would do is study English. I think that this language is the number one most spoken language in the world. If I can learn to speak it, write it and read it, I will be more prepared and qualified and I will have better job opportunities, both here in the USA and in other countries. The ESL Classes affected my life in a good way because I feel more comfortable in this country, and I can communicate with various people from different places and now I have a better job than I had. In my job, I am able to better serve my customers because I can understand English and Spanish. Taking ESL Classes is a big help because I work as a waitress and my salary is based on tips. I arrived in this country two years ago and I can say that I have had a good experience. When I came here the first thing I did was get a job, then I asked some people in my work where I could study English. One woman told me about this school. I have been very happy in this school because I have felt very welcomed. Here it does not matter where I was from. I was able to study and improve my English with people who care about me. They always are able to help me to develop my English.
